- A shift towards primary care in community

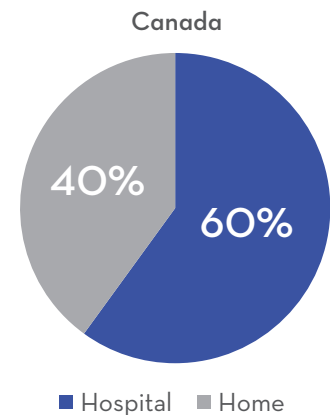
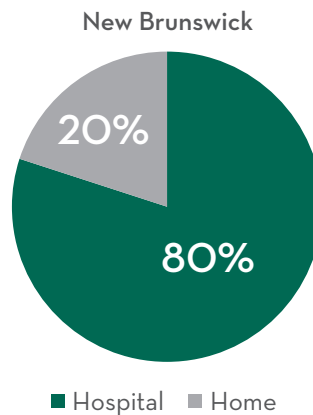
Our Objectives

Location of Death



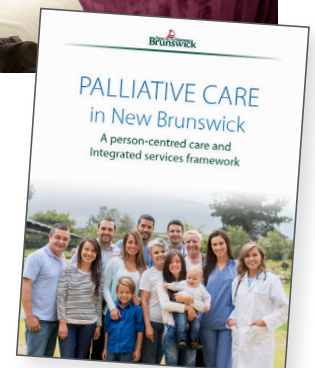
